4. <u>Conflicts of Interest</u>

A list was available for viewing of the existing declarations of Conflicts of Interest. There was no additional declaration of Conflicts of Interests declared.

5. <u>Minutes of Previous Meeting of 10 October 2012:</u>

7. <u>Councillor Allen's Actions and Behaviour:</u>

Chairman Taylor gave an overview of the issues which were that Councillor Tim Allen had sent a letter to the NZC and Regional Chairs which contained statements Phil Teal believes undermined his position and called into question his Integrity. Councillor Allen also implied the Chair, Martin Taylor had applied pressure to Phil Teal using Phil Teal's remuneration as leverage. Councillor Tim Allen also contacted some F&G managers seeking to find out what they had said to Phil Teal to test whether Phil Teal's statements to the WF&G council were correct. This action again called into question Phil Teal's integrity. Phil Teal then raised with the chair his concerns about Councillor Allen's actions. The Chair immediately called a teleconference with other councillors which resulted in a letter of apology to Phil Teal and the agreement to propose a number of motions at the next council meting.

Chairman Taylor then afforded Councillor Allen an opportunity to respond. Councillor Allen asserted that he had changed his mind that the teleconference had no official status and now believes the status of the teleconference was a Briefing Meeting under standing orders which meant he believes that meant no decisions and/or resolutions could be made. He therefore objected to a letter having already been sent following the teleconference.

Chairman Taylor held the opinion that the teleconference was an informal discussion amongst councillors which is allowed and that the resolutions which appeared in the meetings papers were entirely appropriate.

Chairman Taylor asked Councillor Allen whether he meant to call into question the Managers and the Chairs level of integrity in his correspondence and Councillor Allen refused to answer the question.

After further discussion it was moved

That this issue was distasteful and Council should move on to other matters

After further discussion it was moved

That the Wellington Fish & Game Council in no way supports Tim Allen's behaviour in calling into question Phil Teal's integrity;

That the Wellington Fish & Game Council in no way supports Tim Allen's accusation of inappropriate actions by the Chair in relation to the chairs dealings with Phil Teal

That the Wellington Fish & Game Council wishes to apologise completely to Phil Teal for any hurt and reputational loss caused by Tim Allen's behaviour.

That councillor Tim Allen writes a full retraction of his statements and apologises for his behaviour in a letter addressed to the Council and Phil Teal.

That the Wellington Fish & Game Council has no confidence in councillor Tim Allen

Wellington Fish & Game Council agrees to write a letter to apologise to the NZ Fish & Game Council for the breach of trust in receiving and attempting to cause wider use of a legally privileged confidential document owned by the NZ Fish & Game Council, citing our awareness of the reason Wellington Fish & Game Council were denied this document through "official channels" under LGOIMA.

Wellington Fish & Game to write a letter of apology to the "Natural person" whom the NZ Fish & Game Council sought the protection of, citing Wellington Fish & Game's awareness of the reason it was denied the legal opinion through "official channels" under LGOIMA. Tim Allen/Andy Tannock Lost

Chairman Taylor has been almost single minded in his pursuit of said "natural person" since 13 October 2010 where Wellington Fish & Game Council discussed "restricted access". Chairman Taylor has displayed an unnatural interest in the Mai Chen Legal opinion involving said natural person. Wellington Fish & Game Council that Chairman Taylor acted and led Council in bad faith in his dealings with legally privileged information he was well aware Wellington Fish & Game were not entitled to view by: -

- Allowing a legally privileged document to be presented before Council and entertaining discussion of that document;
- Allowing the "hear say" of staff as primary evidence to make a decision with political and potentially legal repercussions;
- Assuring Council there could be no legal repercussions from discussing or distributing the document;
- Acting independently of Council to promote the wider use of the document using Wellington Fish & Game Council's erroneous decision.

8. <u>NZ Council Business</u>

Councillor Morris gave an account of the most recent three-day NZ Council meeting on 23-25 November 2012 in Nelson.

- 3 NZ F&GC councillors not returning (Robin Blakemore, Peter Sutton, Dan Madsen);
- Matthew Hall has indicated he is stepping down as Chairman;
- Councillor Dave Witherow was censured by NZ Council for correspondence regarding the Chief Executive, and NZ Council has asked Otago for a suitable replacement;

- The conflict between Councillor Witherow and the Chief Executive will likely be settled by the next NZ Council meeting;
- Customs Protection Imports Bill has not progressed in this 3 year review;
- A review of use of 20g shotgun will be undertaken in the Gamebird Harvest Survey next year, and requests for status quo to remain in the interim;
- A progress report on a North Canterbury project for having fish tanks in schools that was receiving positive feedback;
- The turnout of voters in regions that had elections was approximately 20%;
- There was interest in considering a class of Fish & Game volunteer to complement the honorary ranger contingent to potentially include less active rangers.
- Discussion was held on use of organophosphates in NZ with the example of diazanon and potential effects on paradise shelduck;
- North Canterbury and CSI had been allocated funds to be involved in the ECan Proposed Canterbury Land & Water Regional Plan. Hawke's Bay had been allocated funds to be involved in the first of the three year projected involvement in the proposed irrigation project hearings. Even this will require a licence fee increase to cover the costs from these and existing cases. If Eastern region BOP Regional Council plan comes up for review then potentially they would be undertaking the case internally; Chairman Taylor commented that the major risks in the next 3-5 years need to be identified and a strategy developed on how to address them;
- Research the level of reporting needs to be improved to inform NZ Council. Research focus and priorities need to be considered as a principal management need;
- Consideration will be given to reviewing the level of funding given that \$100K per year is not a large research budget
- Strategic Planning exercise was discussed with 12 of the goals can be achieved through public awareness campaign rather than solely being seen as antagonistic in the media.
- The Mai Chen legal opinion on conflicts of interest was discussed with Wellington F&GC being the only Council to have read it. A legal opinion from DOC was being sought to discuss the status of the opinion. The person(s) who leaked the document have not been identified.

Discussions continued on how projects could be re-prioritised given the precedence of the legal fund. Councillor Tannock considered that Fish & Game was now in a position of conflict with landowners and needed to target those responsible for the main pollution. Councillor Thomas noted that the size of the legal fund concerns some constituents and considered that they would rather see

money put into wetlands from some source. He noted that several landowners he was aware of were keen to enhance wetlands.

Councillor Johnson considered that game research should deal with aspects we can influence: habitat, harvest, and predators, - this would drive how to spend money on research.

After discussion it was moved

that a letter be sent to NZ Council that focuses on the expectations and impediments for effective research, including resourcing impacts on a region involved in research and how to drive research more effectively <u>Andy Tannock/Richard Moore</u> Carried

Staff were directed to provide a discussion document at a subsequent meeting on opportunities to promote wetland development and how to support local landowners to enhance their property in the current Annual Plan. This would include defining what is already being carried out around NZ, and what aspects of public awareness resources such as brochures are already available.

9. Governance Policy

Discussion ensued on a proposed policy regarding conflicts of interest prepared by Chen & Palmer (dated 18 May 2012), for NZ Council and regional Council consideration. Concern was expressed on the inclusion of draft policy clause 2.8.15 regarding "predetermination".

It was then moved to

Retain the existing Conflict of Interest Policy

10. Draft Game Season Conditions

Discussion ensued on the draft game season conditions paper prepared by staff: <u>Mallard/Grey Duck</u>

The rationale of the staff recommendation was based on a trending down of the aerial transects in the last two years, and being on the borderline of regulatory model for either 6 (restricted) or 8 (normal) week season – a conservative approach would be to go with 6 week season.

After discussion and explanation it was moved

That season conditions be "normal" – and an eight week season be adopted

12. <u>One Plan Update</u>

Mr Teal gave a brief update on the High Court Appeal noting that transfers of information and evidential scope were being undertaken. It was unlikely that any hearing would occur before March.

13. Licence Working Party

Mr Teal gave a brief update that negotiations were about to commence and a draft agreement had been formulated by the working party and contract lawyer.

14. <u>Management Report 1 October – 19 November 2012</u>

Mr Teal reiterated the staff efforts on RMA projects within the Wellington region and also assistance with regional planning issues in other regions:

- Ruataniwha Project (Hawke's Bay) providing technical appraisal and leading project
- Hawke's Bay RPS providing technical planning overview and coordinating submission
- ECan Plan providing technical critique and co-ordinating external assistance
- Several key planning process for the Wairarapa rivers Flood Management Plan were currently being developed and discussed

Mr Teal confirmed that some progress had been made with NZ Defence Force in seeking relaxation of the "no public access" policy.

16. <u>Licence Sales Report to 21 November 2012</u>

Mr Teal indicated that licence sales were down about 3% on budget but initiatives were being put into place for December to generate interest for stronger December sales. It was moved that

17. <u>Correspondence</u>

Nothing to discuss.

18. <u>General Business</u>

Nic Cudby gave a brief presentation on the issues and initiatives around Lake Wairarapa and wetlands - by Fish & Game and use of the Clean Up Fund by Wairarapa Moana.

Steve Pilkington gave a brief presentation on issuance of bird dispersal permits and provided Council with information on the issues and approaches to be taken.

Members of the public afforded an opportunity to speak:

John Jones expressed concern at possible initiatives by some landowners to refuse access to hunters as publicity on One Plan Environment Court decision did not leave Fish & Game in good light and that is was affecting his ability to access some hunting oppurtunities. He was seeking a balanced approach by all parties to resolve any One Plan issues.

Councillor Cotsilinis responded that the issue was balancing the need to stop nutrients getting in water or lose fishing opportunity. Councillor Johnson noted that the process appeared to follow the pattern of establishing a balance now then some time later reassess balance then - resulting in trending degradation. Councillor Allen noted that one of F&G's functions is to enhance access, and water quality is not just a F&G issue, and Fish & Game may have lost focus on access potential.

Dave West expressed his aspiration for grey teal to be a gamebird. Mr Teal gave a brief overview on the approach being taken, which required consistent support within Fish & Game and a willingness of DoC to clearly identify any impediments to progressing.

Mr West also thought Fish & Game needed to restore relationships with landowners which had been eroded in the last 10 years, with the risk expressed that Fish & Game becoming marginalized. Councillor Morris indicated that NZ Council had been making efforts to restore relationships at senior levels of Federated Farmers – with the view expressed that many farmers believe changes were needed but not to extent currently presented.

Reg Cull also expressed his view that F&G risked being marginalized citing the Canada goose Game Schedule removal debate as a potential warning. He also noted that black swan numbers were low on 1st weekend and that the 2nd "opening" on Queens Birthday weekend did not occur. He also cited an example of a landowner reclaiming 50 acres of accreted wetland on public land and would follow this up.

There being no further business the meeting was closed at 5.50pm.
